Our students are continuing to look at the different whetu in our Tutarawānanga learner profile.

Our focus has been Manaakitanga and Kaitiaki Te Ao.

Our students have been showing us through their actions what our Manaakitanga Whetu looks like in our kura.

It has been a pleasure to watch our students looking after others in our community.

Relieving teachers have been treated with respect and welcomed.

Even though their teacher is not in the classroom the learning continues.

Visitors are welcomed with kia ora and a smile.

The ambassadors give of their time willingly during intervals to support our younger students in the playground.

These are just a few examples we are regularly seeing at our kura.

The whetu Kaitiaki Te Ao will become a focus over the term.

An area that we would like to improve is our students being responsible for making sure that all our deck areas are clear of rubbish, clothing not left behind and food scraps put in the bin.

Whaea Bex is going to be checking the decks out as she locks the school up each afternoon.

At the end of each week the deck area that has been the tidiest will be announced at our hui and the Nga Kaitiaki trophy awarded to the winning classes.

Healthy Active Learning.

Last term in conjunction with Tauranga City Council and the healthy active learning team some of our students were surveyed to find out what areas around our kura could be used to encourage the concept of stop and play safely. Our students identified the alleyway space by the school that runs to the Aroha Centre.

Already there is a concrete path that our students use. Sport Bay of plenty have a number of "play stencils" that they are prepared to loan to us so we can paint play designs on the concrete path. This will be happening on the 6-8th of September.

Sensory Garden update.

The idea for developing this area was after Tehemanawa Walker who was a very much loved student at our kura sadly passed away. Students in Te Awanui wanted an area where students could sit quietly and be reflective.

An area that had bright flowers, an area that had plants with strong scents that could be smelt, an area that has edible plants and fruits.

The ideas for the sensory garden area are still evolving and classes are discussing the next steps. Stu and some students will be boxing the area around the seats and planters to define the seating area. Senior classes will be writing letters to businesses to see if they can get support for the project from them. Do you have any plants or shrubs that were a favourite to someone special to you and your whānau. This is a chance to donate that special plant so your child is able to tell a story about that special plant when it is planted in the sensory garden.

We are also after plants that are colourful and heavily scented. Can you help us with this. If so please come and chat to me.
